Genesis 12:1-9; 15:1-6; 21:1-7



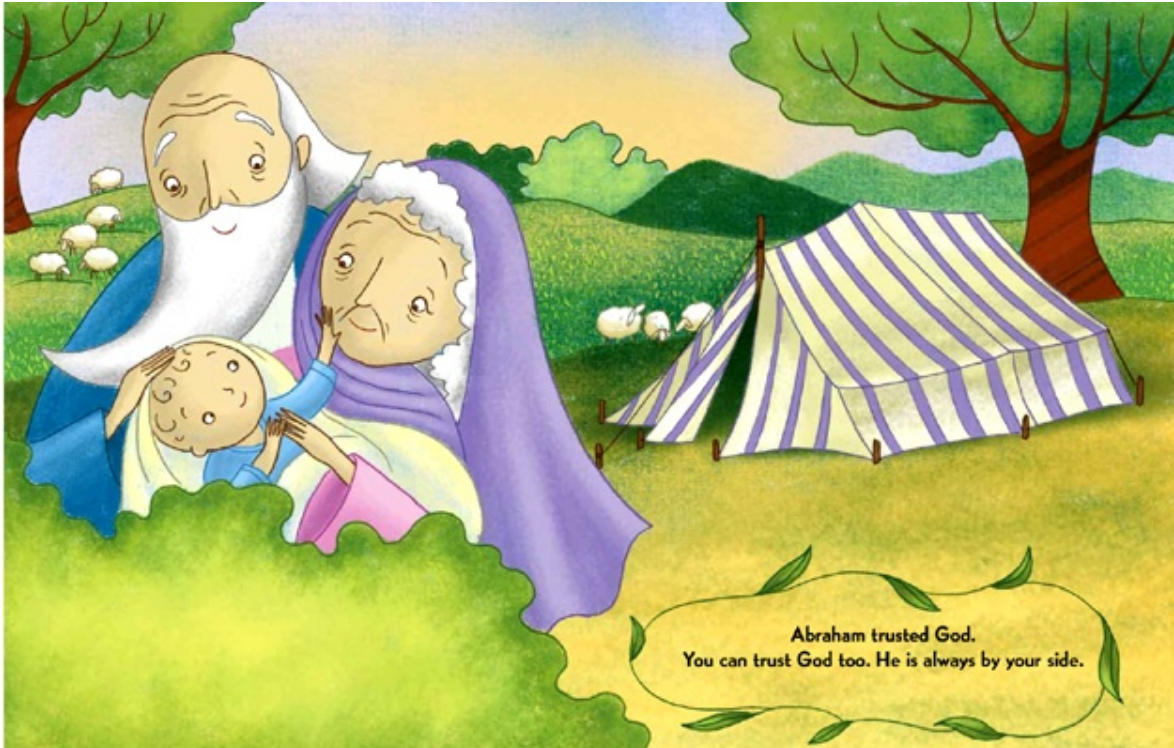
Abraham was a good man who trusted God. God told Abraham, “I want you to leave your home and your country and go to a new land I will show you.”

Pharaoh's daughter saw the basket floating down the river. She rescued the baby, named him Moses, and raised him as her own son.



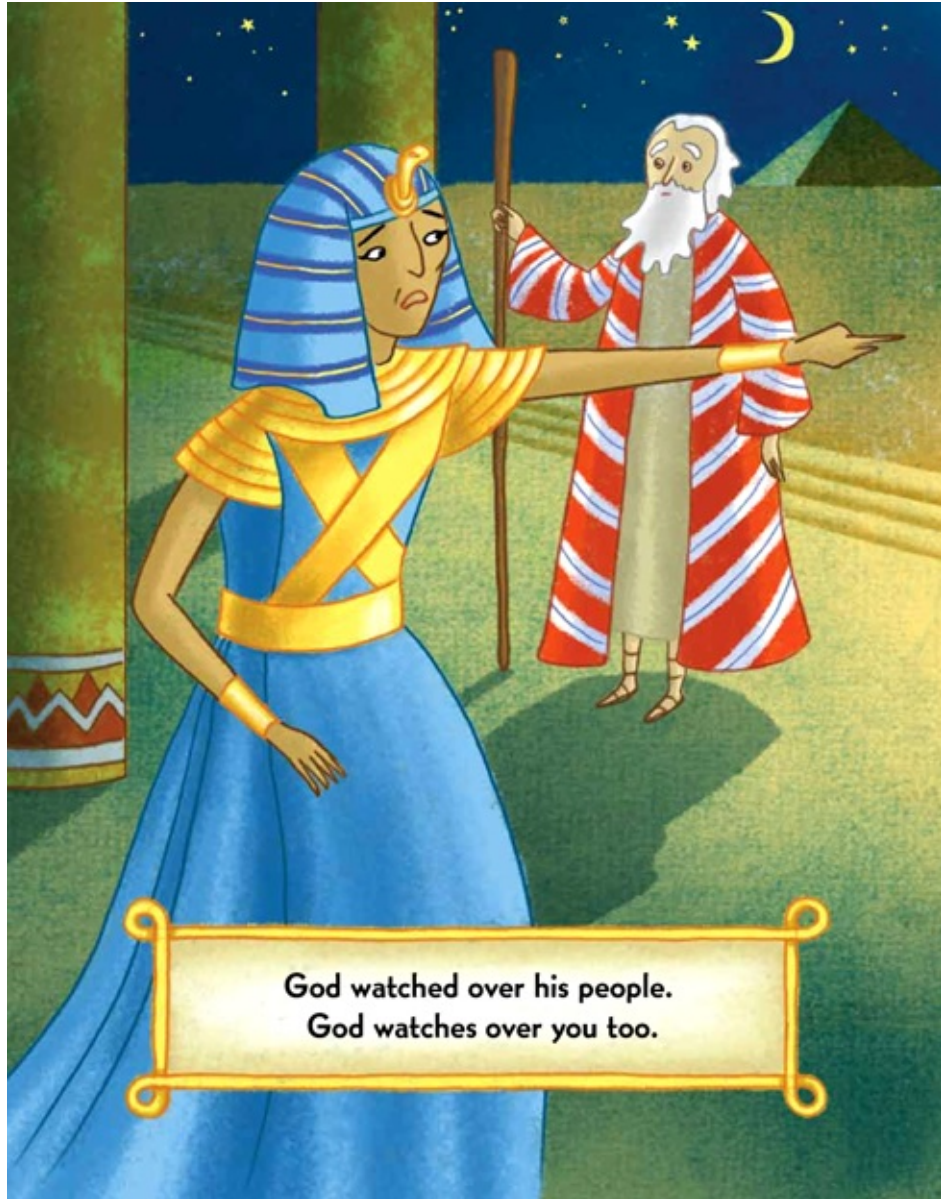

CHAPTER 5

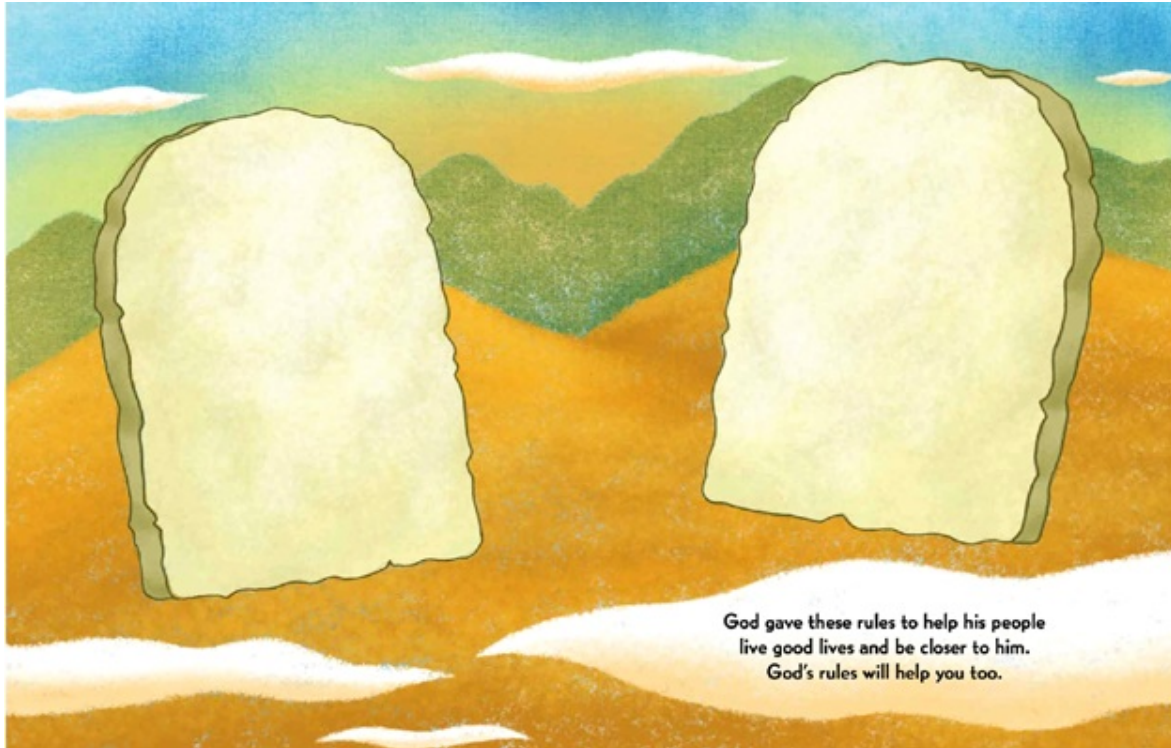
The Ten Commandments

CHAPTER 9

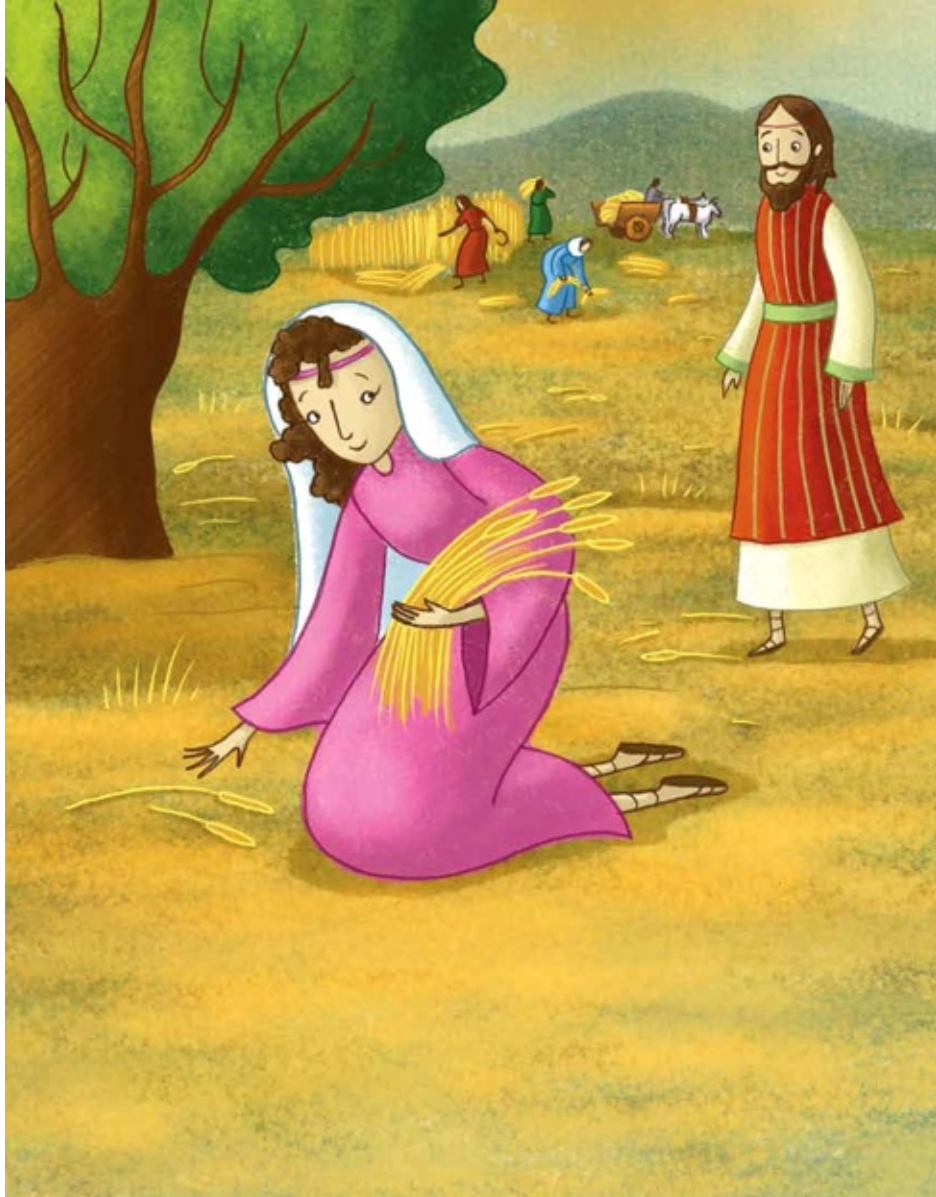
Two Kind People

Ruth 1–4



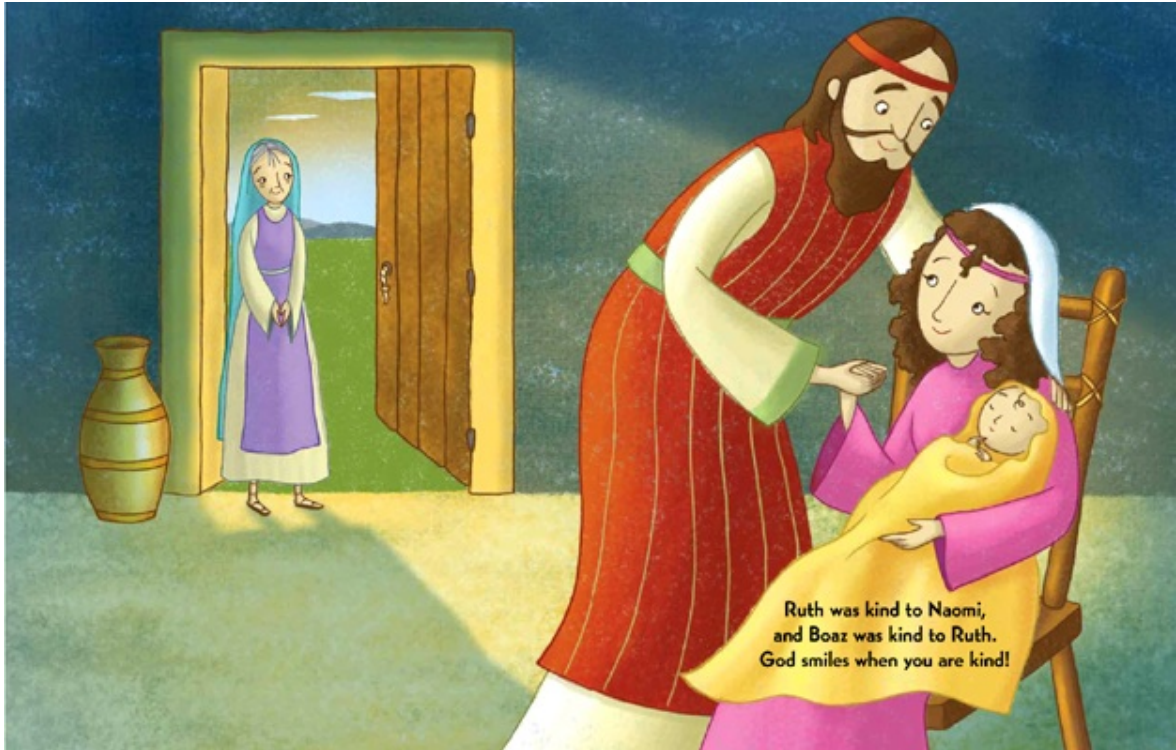

The soldiers shook with fear. Nobody could beat that giant!

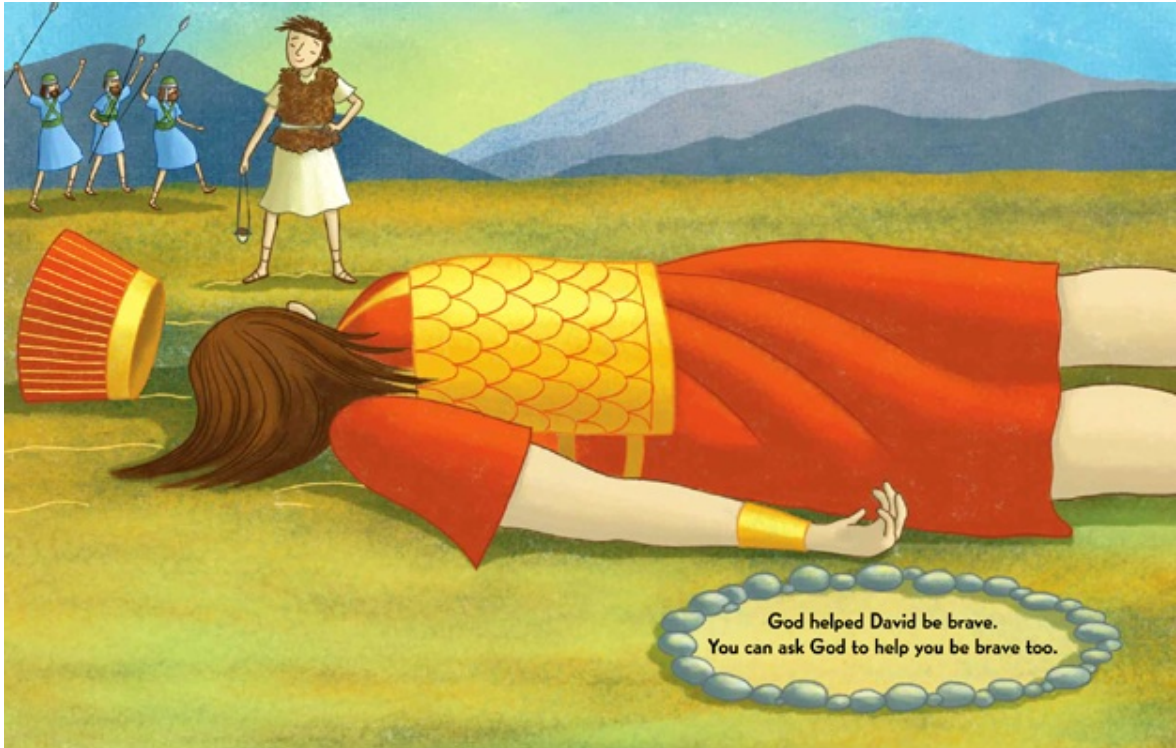
But David wasn't afraid. "God is on our side! I'll fight the giant!"

1 Kings 3, 9–10

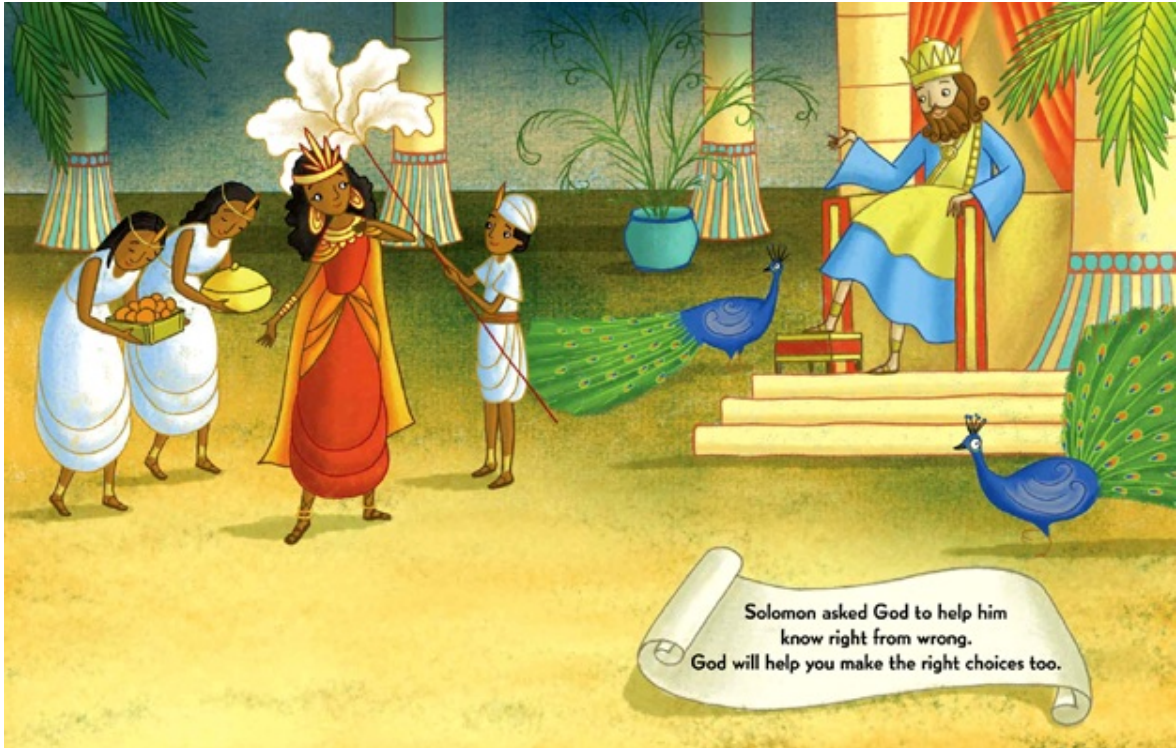


King David had a son named Solomon. Solomon became the next king of Israel.

Isaiah 33, 6–7, 40



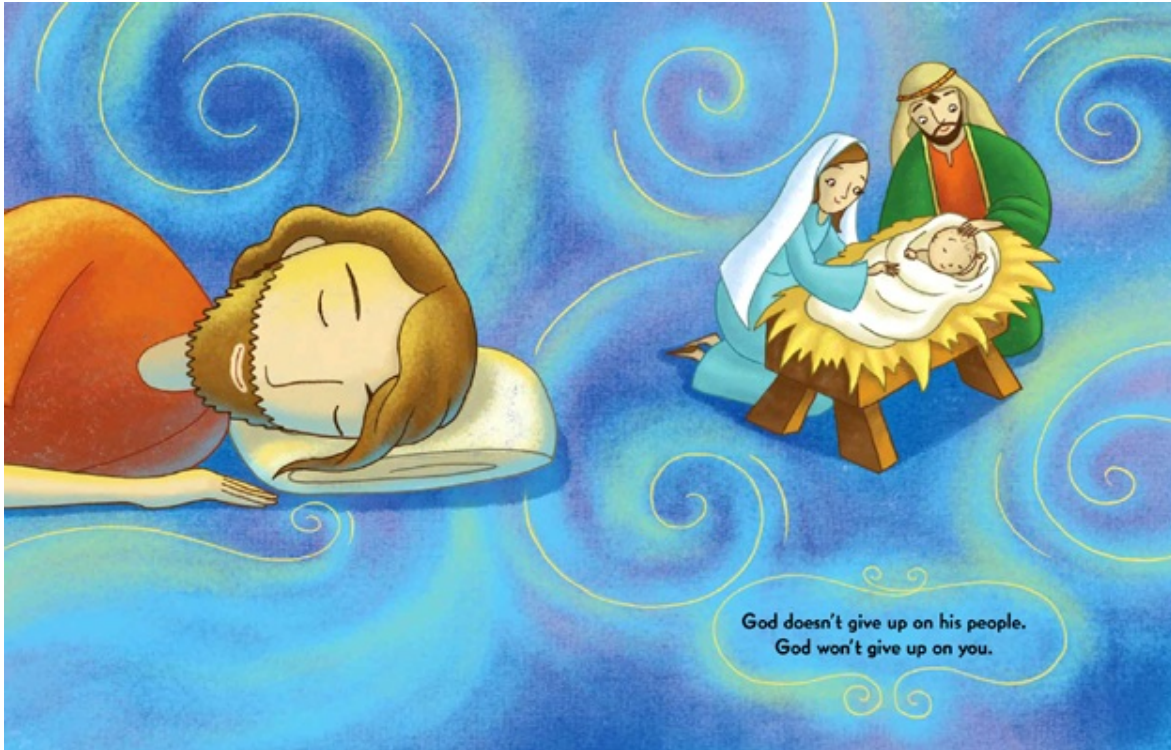

Nehemiah 2–4



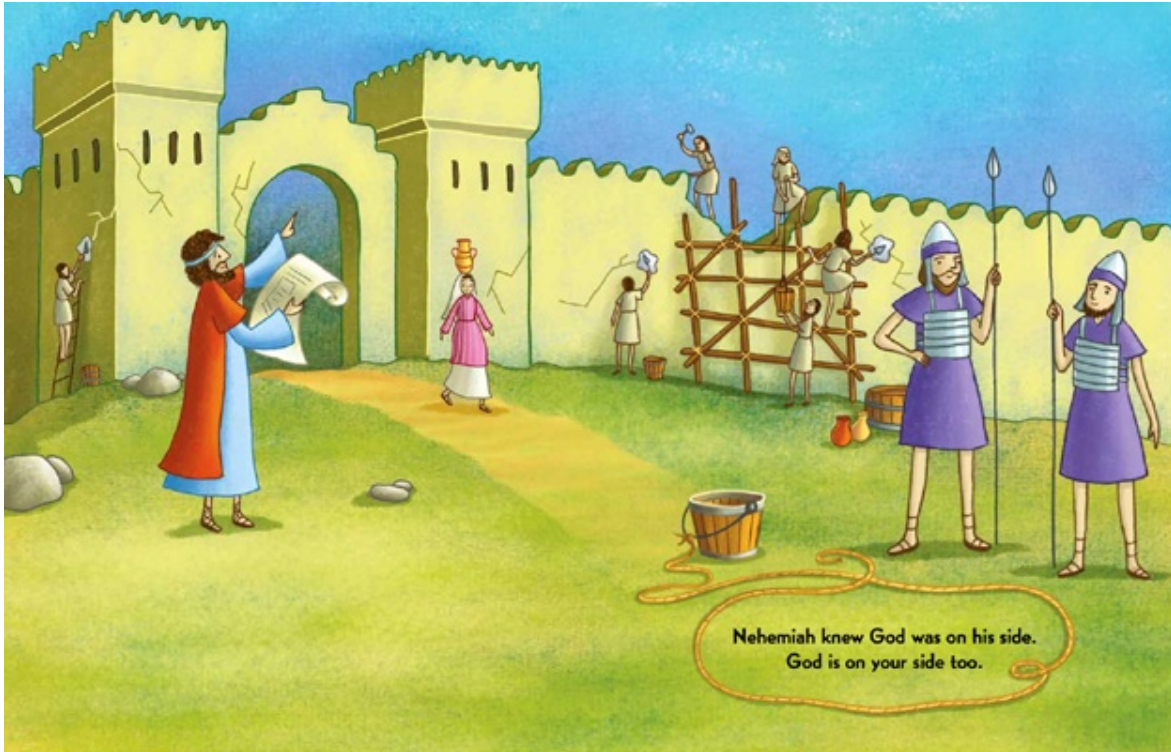

Matthew 3:13–17; Mark 1:9–11

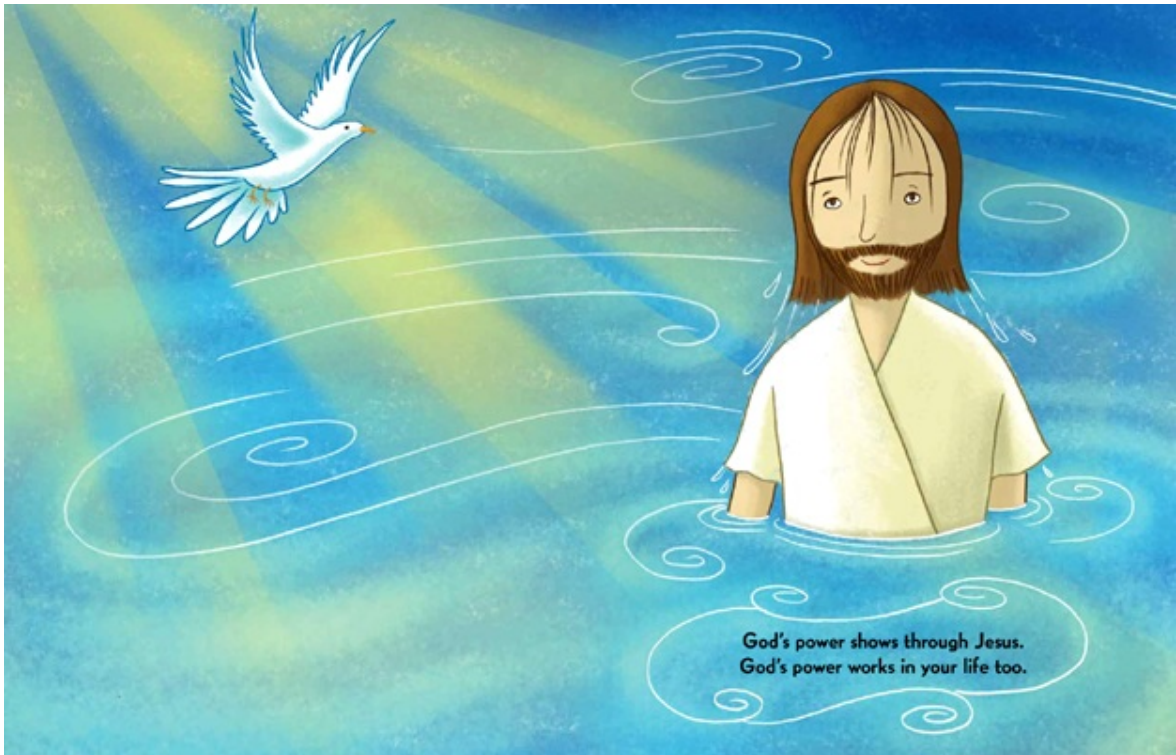

Jesus, the Teacher

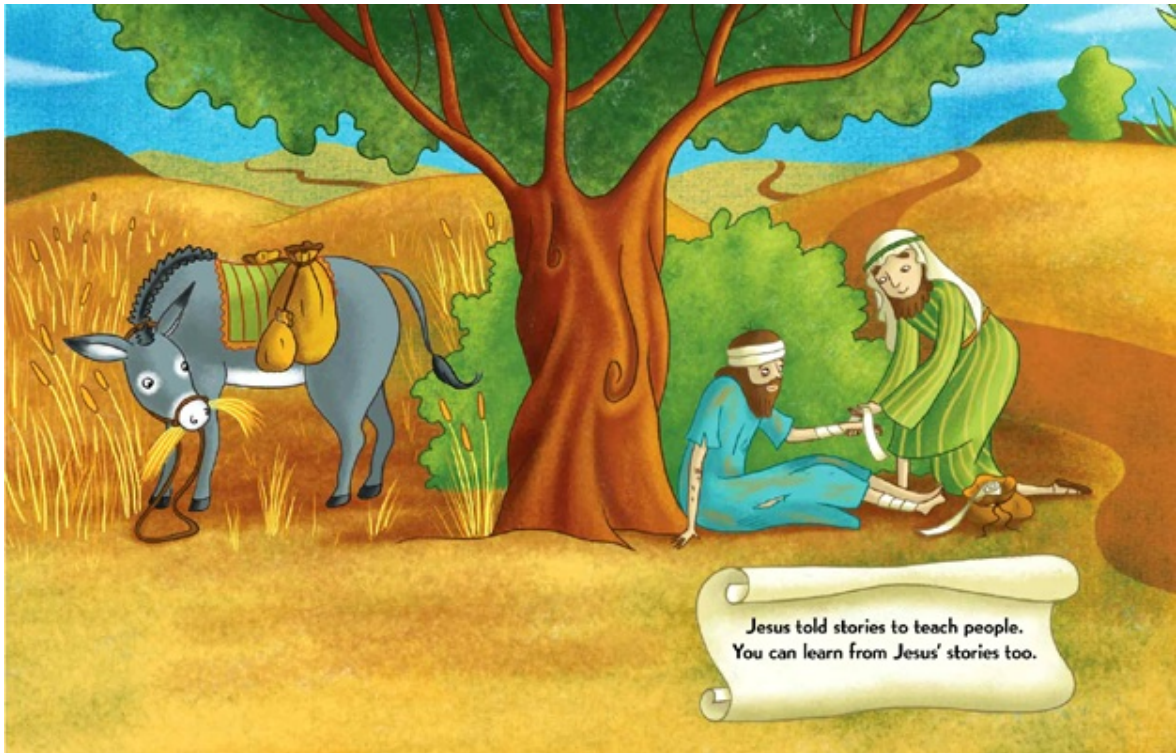
Matthew 22:34–40; Mark 12:28–31; Luke 10:25–37

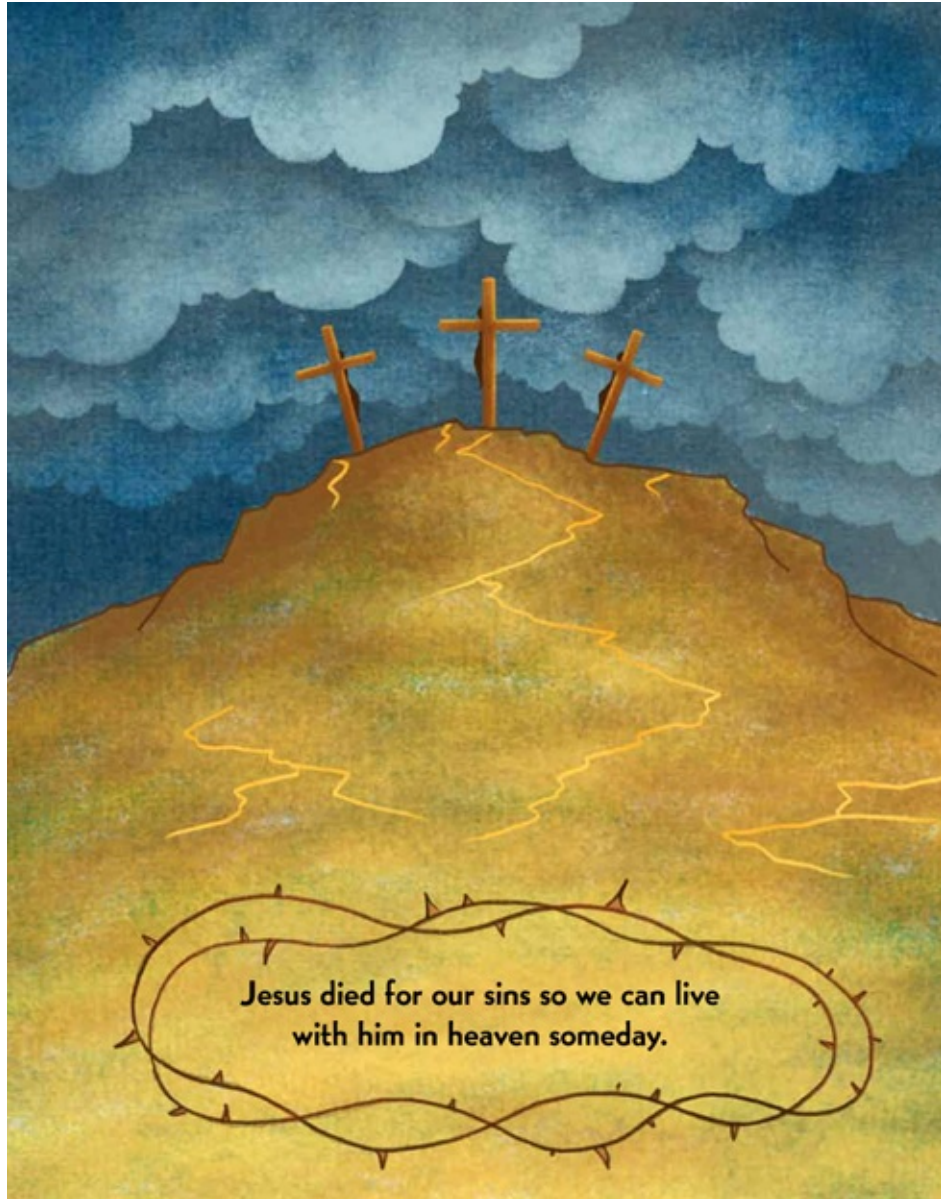


Then Jesus went to a garden to pray. He knew something bad was going to happen because he had told people about God's kingdom.

Jesus Has Risen!

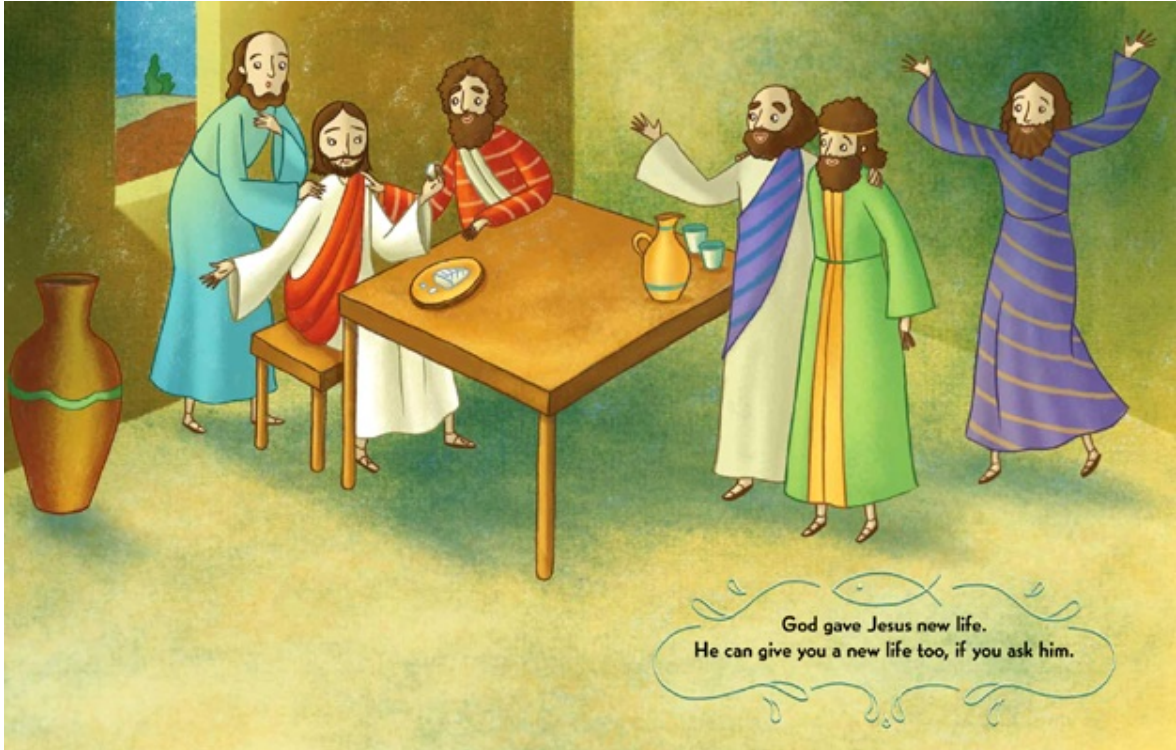
Matthew 28; Mark 16; Luke 24; John 20–21

The Holy Spirit

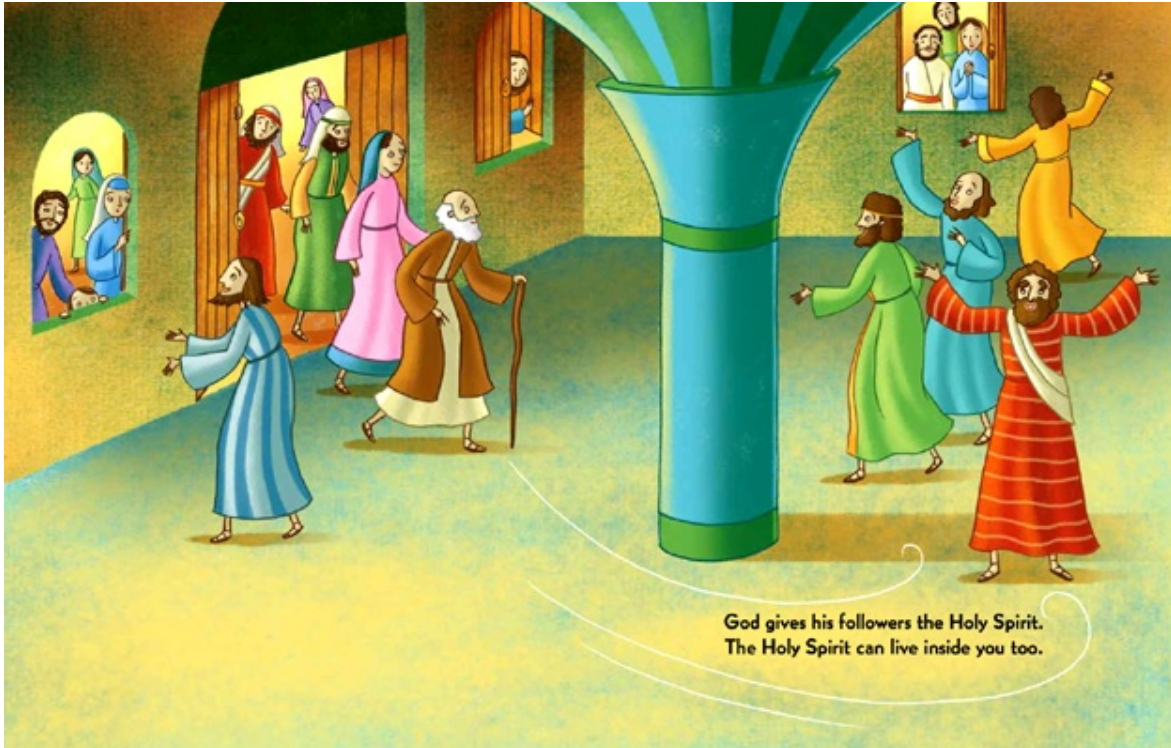
Acts 2

Paul talked to God. Then he told everyone that the ship would be destroyed, but all the people would be safe.



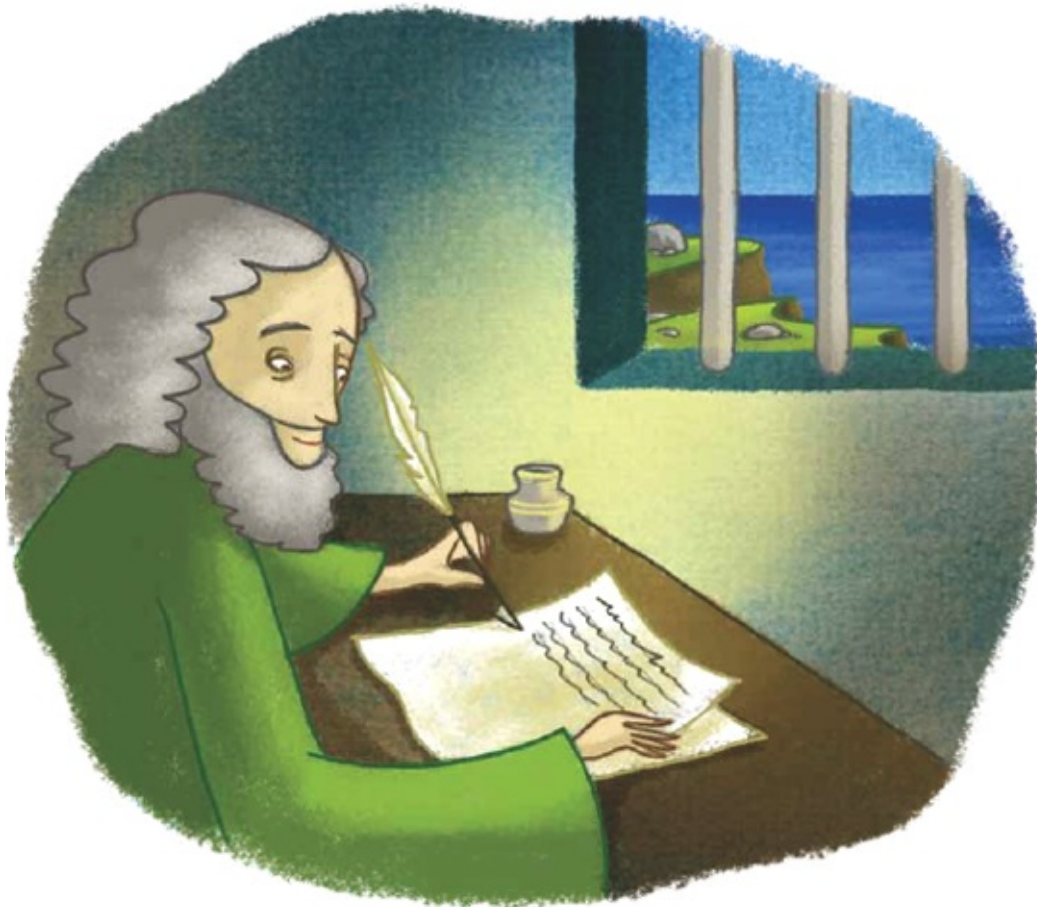
Paul was right. The boat crashed near an island. The people reached the shore safely. Everyone thanked God for saving them.
